## EAIA MEET AT JEFFERSON'S POPLAR FOREST By Tom Jennings

On March 19, the Early American Industries Association held its regional meeting at Thomas Jefferson's Poplar Forest just inside Bedford County, VA.



Early expectations of the number of folks attending was about a dozen or so, but I believe the count ended up being about eighty, with three RATS members. Most of the attendees were from Virginia, but there were folks from Pennsylvania, Tennessee, North Carolina, New Jersey and New York. There was some tailgating tool sales until about 10 a.m. when staff guided tours of Poplar Forest began.

There were tours of the house, the basement and the wing. Here Dave Clauss gives a tour of the basement:



It was good to see Dave Clauss again. Dave gave the talk at K.T. Burchett's RATS get-together last April.

Before lunch Brian Coe, Director of Historical Interpretation, Old Salem Museums & Gardens,

Winston-Salem, NC demonstrated wooden plane making.



Some of the topics he touched on were the different angles of the iron for use on different woods, the size of the cutting opening, making and tempering irons, and the use of a 'mother plane' to make multiple molding planes.

After a buffet lunch, Vince Fastabend and Dave Clauss opened the restoration workshop up for visits and questions. This was followed by Travis McDonald, Director of Architectural Restoration at Poplar Forest, speaking on the initial construction and restoration of the house and grounds.



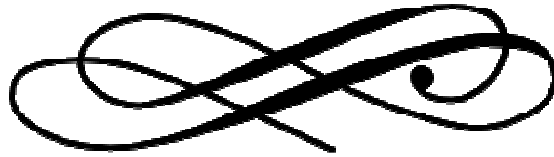
The house itself is really amazing. Where Monticello is fully restored and furnished, Poplar Forest is a slow restoration work in progress. Parts of the interior are literally cut-away, showing the different wall

layers. Personally, getting to see the house, and some of the behind the scenes work areas was a real treat.



#### A few facts about Poplar Forest

- The house is sometimes referred to as “the unknown chapter of Jefferson”
- Construction began in 1806
- Thought to be the first octagonal house in America
- Added the wing of ‘offices’ in 1814
- Where Monticello was always loud and full of visitors, Poplar Forest was quiet and Jefferson’s ‘hide-away’; he would visit there about four times a year and stay from two weeks to two months.
